

The month of July sees the opening ceremony of the Commonwealth Games on 23rd July. This will be the twentieth competition. It is a unique competition in which the home countries compete for their own nations of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. It dates back to the British Empire. The first games were held in 1930 in Hamilton, Canada where 11 countries sent 400 athletes to take part in six sports and 59 events. Since then, the Games have been held every four years (except for 1942 and 1946 because of the Second World War), and the event has seen many changes, not least in its name. From 1930 to 1950 the Games were known as the British Empire Games, from 1954 until 1966 the British Empire and Commonwealth Games and from 1970 to 1974 they took on the title of British Commonwealth Games. It was the 1978 Games in Edmonton that saw this multi-sports event change its name to the Commonwealth Games. It is interesting to see how the name has changed with the demise of the British Empire.

Scotland hosted the Games in 1970 and 1986. There are now 17 different sports. I shall be watching the rugby sevens and the athletics. If the winter Olympics are anything to go by, I shall end up watching the bowls. Who would have guessed that curling could be so exciting! As with all sports it is the taking part that is really important. Winning should be the bonus to participating. It is sometimes sad that all that people focus on is the winners, it is just as important to achieve your personal best performance. It may not win you a medal but you will be rewarded with the knowledge that you did your very best. It so important to do the best you can.

The bible use images of participating in a race. Paul reminds the Corinthian church that the race of life (1 Corinthians 9 vs. 24-26) is about an imperishable prize, eternal life. The sense is that we should all enter, compete and be fully prepared for engaging in life and trying our best. We are to be encouraged that God and the great cloud of witnesses who have already run the race now surround us and cheer us on in the race that is life (Hebrews 12 vs.1-2).

As we watch the Commonwealth Games and cheer on our favourites, let us also remember how hard the other competitors have worked in training and look out for personal best performances. It is the same for God who sees all of our best efforts and encourages us to keep going and do our best!

SATURDAY SURPRISE - FAREWELL!!

Some seven years ago, it was becoming evident that the monthly Family Service in church was losing out to competition from childrens' activities and sports, and something was needed to replace it if young peoples' church needs were to be catered for.

And so Saturday Surprise was born with the agreement of families who still wished their children to have some church input and with the Vicar who would have to fit it into his schedule. A small group was formed who have continued to meet ahead of each session to plan the content. 6.00 pm on a Saturday was chosen to fall between afternoon and evening family activities and to happen six or seven times during the year, interspersed with normal Sunday morning Family Services in church.

So on a Saturday in October 2007, after full advertising, we waited in the Parish Hall to see who, if anyone, would turn up. By 5.50pm there was only a scattering, but by 6.00pm over sixty people of all ages had arrived to see what it was all about! We never saw that number again but, for several years, we hovered around the 40's and 30's, many more than we would normally see in church. Interestingly, although the focus was intended to be the dozen or so teenagers whose interest we hoped to retain, several much older people came to look forward to this refreshing new way of "doing church".

A small and faithful group of musicians led the singing and we chose mainly modern worship songs, mixed in with familiar hymns, to try to cater for all tastes. A Powerpoint projector was obtained with a grant from the Diocese, to enable modern style presentation of a wide and varied range of Bible stories which formed the basis of the Vicar's talks, with musical and pictorial interludes providing time for reflection and silent prayer. Initially we tried to introduce a different "surprise" each time, but ideas started to run out! But the name stuck.

But now, seven years later, most of the initial group of young people have left home or gone to University and sadly they haven't been replaced. Numbers have started to shrink and the format has become a bit tired. So the time has come to think again about a fresh alternative to be interspersed with regular Sunday worship, and a new planning group are hoping to come up with some ideas for 2015.

We would like to thank all who have supported this venture, and enabled us to keep it going until now. We wish the new planning group well as prayerfully they seek guidance and inspiration for the future.

The Chairman opened the meeting. The minutes of the Parish Council Meetings held on 8th May and 3rd June 2014 having been circulated were taken as read and signed as a true copy by the Chairman with the addition of "livery related parking" to the 3rd June minutes.

REPORTS FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR / DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

District Councillor Bromell had nothing to report but said that he would make enquiries regarding a query from Cllr Nierop concerning a change in future arrangements for green waste

County Councillor Brook had sent his apologies and the Clerk read his report to the meeting which included a statement that he remains convinced that the outcomes of various ongoing consultations will lead to very different systems of delivery.

PLANNING

Planning Application

14/01440/VAR Variation on condition 2 on planning permission 11/00872/FUL (Alterations and extensions to existing dwelling) to amend approved plans to include re-building of annexe, include two velux windows in the roof and an additional window to the front at Heath House. Councillors examined the submission and plans and after discussion there were no objections.

Grant of Conditional Planning

14/00950/FUL Demolition of existing building and erection of four stables, fodder store and tackroom on land off Bondhouse Lane.

14/00579/FUL Closure of existing access, change of use of agricultural land to domestic use including formation of new access and driveway and erection of double garage at Hall Farm, Tedburn Road.

Appeal Decision

14/00009/REF Appeal against refusal of planning permission No 13/03212 - Outline for dwelling at Rebecca Springs, Nadderwater. Appeal dismissed (Delegated refusal)

MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION

Independent Internal Audit

The Clerk reported on the Audit completed by Mr K Abraham on the 29th May as follows "In accordance with testing strategy developed in the Financial Risk Assessment, which continues to be a low audit risk, testing was carried out as appropriate". It was noted that two items had been brought to the attention of the Clerk regarding the Annual Return to be returned to the Audit Commission and these had been duly amended as appropriate before its submission.

Whitestone Parish Hall Committee of Management A request has been received for payment of a £900 contribution towards double glazing to the Parish Hall, which had totalled £1,960.80, as agreed in October 2013 (minute 72.1). The Clerk had informed the Hall Committee of receipt of the grant of £900 from the Electors Fund for the defribrillator to be based at the Parish Hall and it was also requested that this should now be forwarded to them in order that Dr Jane Richards, who has connections with the British Heart Foundation can make the necessary arrangements concerning purchase. The Hall Committee will take the lead in arranging training but it is unlikely this will occur before the Autumn. It was resolved that a cheque for £1,800 should therefore be authorised.

Cost Reinstatement Valuations for 1 and 2 School Houses

This had now been received from Wilkinson Grant & Co. at a cost of £120, and owing to the revaluations it was

noted by them that the insurance cover should be for a sum not less than £180,000 for No 1 and £184,000 for No 2. Came and Company, our Insurance Company had been informed and an additional premium of £248.44 was required for the 2014/15 period of cover. This had been paid as the cover commences on the 1st June 2014.

School Houses

Report on Public Meeting

Cllr Bramhall addressed the meeting on the proceedings of this meeting. 59 persons had attended including Parish Councillors. Apologies had been received from Cllr Reed.

A report on the Public Meeting was distributed to Parish Councillors – this being in the form of notes as no official minutes were taken.

The aim of meeting was to present the findings of the School Houses Working Group via a presentation and subsequent question and answer session and Cllr Bramhall felt that this aim was achieved.

There were several relevant and significant points that emerged from the question and answer session, some of which showed us, as present and past Parish Council members, to be lacking in knowledge that we as landlords should possess. Cllr Bramhall informed the meeting that she had made efforts to make good those blanks by making enquiries through the Letting Agents and the Secretary of the Devon Association of Local Councils regarding the housing standards and legislation under the Housing, Health and Safety Rating System (HHSRS). Cllr Bramhall had also addressed the question of applying for a loan if it was decided to upgrade the houses and the Council do not have sufficient funds.

Cllr Bramhall stated that "in her view that if there was any consensus from the meeting it was that the School Houses Working Group Report highlighted a potentially major financial problem for us, but the report was not in itself a sufficient basis for a decision to sell but rather emphasised the need to commission a professionally produced set of commercially based accounts which incorporate the results of an independent survey aimed at making us legal and based on the terms of reference produced and agreed by us, the Parish Council as a whole, at this meeting. There was some criticism of the report from Teignbridge Housing Association, unfair in my view, and had we been able to produce a written set of terms of reference endorsed by the Parish Council we could I think have silenced some, not all, of those critics and I criticise myself in making that statement".

Cllr Bramhall then invited every Councillor in attendance to give their views on the meeting and this took place with Cllr Nierop responding to criticism regarding the financial calculations that had been included in his report. He stated that he had sought advice regarding this and he had been informed that it is legitimate and correct to base calculations of income/expenditure from the date when properties came under the Parish Council's ownership or date when the decision was made to retain and let the properties (in 2006) regardless of whether properties were occupied or not.

After lengthy discussion regarding several of the issues raised it was proposed that an Independent Survey should be requested to be undertaken by Teignbridge District Council Housing Services in order to identify any defects/hazards affecting the health and safety of tenants. This proposal was seconded and voted on and passed with one Councillor abstaining.

Cllr Bramhall is to make enquiries regarding the services of a qualified accountant in readiness for when the independent survey has been received.

Asset Group Membership

Cllr Hickman spoke saying that he wished to resign from this Group and Cllr Nierop added that he was resigning also. The Chairman asked for volunteers willing to fill their places and Cllr Reed agreed to rejoin. Other Councillors not present at this meeting will be asked at the July meeting if they would be willing to serve.

MATTERS RAISED BY THE CHAIRMAN

Cllr Bramhall requested the Clerk to write to Mr David Oakey and thank him for presiding at the Public Meeting and this was reiterated by the Councillors

An invitation has been received and accepted from Teignbridge District Council for her to attend the Raising of the Armed Forces Flag on 23rd June

- Letters of thanks have been received from the Whitestone Gardening Club and the Parochial Church Council for the donations which were received by their associations following the May meeting.
- Devon County Council Transport Co-ordination Service had replied following further correspondence regarding the bus service 173 and stated that it is not their policy for the 1853 service to pass through Whitestone and they assume if a bus has been seen it has been when an irregular driver was on the service who was not aware of the different route. It was also stated that given the additional cost of operating via Whitestone they are not prepared to make any alteration to the existing timetable. They ask that if parishioners do see a bus again that it is reported and further enquiries can be made with Dartline.
- Information regarding road closures between 26th May and 31st August on roads past Glebe Farm, St Catherines Cottage to Trillow Corner, road from Twiscombe Corner to Pound Down Corner to enable road repairs were relayed to the meeting.

REPORTS

- Cllr Hickman asked if investigation could be made regarding the triangle of grass containing a signpost where the Exeter boundary meets Whitestone. It is very overgrown and the Clerk was requested to ascertain whose responsibility it is to trim the area.
- Cllr Phillips said that he had received complaints regarding "dog fouling" in the lanes around Whitestone and hoped that dog owners could be more considerate to walkers about the disposal of this
- Cllr Neirop reported on attending the DALC meeting in May when a representative from the Environment Agency had discussed landfill and recycling issues. He asked if the Clerk could ascertain from Mr Brunt, Neighbourhood Highway Manager for Devon County Council the findings of the drain survey which had been completed in February which had also been an item discussed.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Mr Hodges said that he had been in contact with Cllr Nierop in regard to his concerns over the financial statement which had been made at the Public Meeting regarding School Houses as he felt that calculations should have been made from the date when the houses had been let commercially.

Mrs Taylor praised the Council for taking on board what had been said at the Public Meeting and was pleased that they were looking into the matter in more depth and Mrs Greenfield added her support for this action.

Mrs Greenfield gave the following update on the progress of the Parish Plan Steering Group:- "Matters are ongoing with the web enabling of the questionnaire and it is hoped to conclude this soon".

The meeting closed at 9.45pm.

THE HEALTH CORNER ON TOMATO KETCHUP

A study by Dr J. Cheriyan, a consultant pharmacologist at Addenbrooke's hospital, has found that lycopene, which is found in tomatoes, improves the widening of blood vessels by 53% and thus helps to reduce the likelihood of strokes and heart attacks.

He says Lycopene is a powerful antioxidant ten times more potent than vitamin E and its' effect is enhanced when the tomatoes are pureed or in the form of tomato ketchup, or in the presence of olive oil.



JUNE ON THE FARM

Midsummer magic gives wild growth at its fullest extent. Blink and plants everywhere reach for the sun at its highest in the sky. Leaves that started spring as every conceivable green all become mid green, as every one concentrates on the serious business on converting sun's energy to food. Hatched chicks fledge. Baby rabbits explore daftly, tasty morsels



for foxes, buzzards and ravens. A goose nesting up the valley honks mournfully. I haven't yet worked out where she is.

The farm shares in the plenty of midsummer. The flowering barley makes the wind visible as the heavy heads and spiky awns sway, heart-stoppingly beautiful when I give myself the time to notice it. Wheat, more bluey-green, and without the spikes, flowers at the end of June. We hope for some dry weather during each crops' flowering to get the best set for the wind-borne pollen.

CROPS - The crops we sow for winter feed, maize, fodder beet and kale look exquisite as they come up in green rows on our red soil snaking to the end of the field. Even rows and even spacing means the most yield, orderliness giving a visceral satisfaction that we can provide for our animals over winter.

Grass grows in front of the cattle, faster than they can eat it. The pastures the cows keep eating stay rich and leafy, perfect food to grow meat and milk just as it is. Humans can't eat grass; pasture-produced meat and milks as well as being delicious are the animal proteins that use the least human-edible food: eat it and feel virtuous.

Let the surplus grass start sending its flowering stalk up, and you can choose what balance of protein, fibre and sugar to harvest for winter feed. Harvest in June, as late first-cut silage or hay, and you get lots of bulk and fibre, as the plants throw up unpalatable flowers supported on stalky stems. Good for a winter bellyful, less good to produce growth and milk.

HEIFERS - The heifers are growing the best they've grown for years, making compensatory growth on the rich grass. It's good to reassure ourselves that their soggy outdoor winter did them no harm. It is a triumph of the fencing work we've been doing over the last year. We can get them to graze properly, so the fresh growth is the cleanest and most nutritious (no old leaves left behind). In the past, we would have to move them before they had finished up properly, giving them rank old leaves to eat next time round. They had learned our fencing had weak points and would lean on them to get to more interesting pasture.

COWS - Most of the spring cows are served by the beginning of the month, and most are pregnant by the end. The riot of lust leads to embryos settling nicely into their beds of crimson womb-beds, that delicate time just ten days after serving. We don't change anything just then, for fear we could knock out the tiny bundles of cells, future calves.

CHEESE - The milk settles into a lovely milk for cheesemaking, Malcolm Mitchell's favourite. His depth of knowledge and skill, garnered over the years, is the killer app of our cheese quality. 'Just do it as it's meant to be done' he says. And he knows what to do, and when. He's trained and shaped the whole cheese dairy team, and leads from the front in the heavy work of making our 27 kg / 60lb wheels.

In the store, the quiet work of maturing continues, powered now by our photovoltaic panels sited on the cheese store roof. Just the sweet spot, as we use the most power in cooling the stores at the time of year when the sun's rays are at their most powerful.

AWARDS - Delighted to announce at the British Cheese Awards 2014 we picked up gold & Best Cheddar for our Vintage! As well as silver for Smoked Goats and Elderflower and bronze for Mature and Extra Mature. Extremely proud of all the Quickes team.

QUICKES FARM KITCHEN - Soooo excited to launch our Quickes Farm Kitchen, our pop-up cafe and restaurant, featuring all the delicious foods we stock in the shop, so many of them the products of the sun, soil and water of this valley. The menu is designed and prepared by distinguished local chef Deborah Custance Baker, fresh from making a real success of the Cafe at the Innovation Centre of the University. It's the opportunity to try the products, foraged by Alice Blatchford, who's worked hard to seek out most delicious local and artisan foods.

Quickes Farm Kitchen was formally opened by the Earl and Countess of Wessex on Tuesday 10th June. We were really honoured to be chosen as part of Prince Edward's 50th birthday tour of the 'Best of Wessex'.

RECIPE - Focaccia with Quickes cheddar, olives & red onions

12 oz (350 g) plain white flour, plus a little for dusting ½ level teaspoon salt

2 level teaspoons easy-blend yeast

1½ tablespoons extra virgin olive oil

For the topping:

2 small red onions, halved and then sliced into 1/4 inches

4 oz (110 g) pitted black olives halved

4 teaspoons chopped fresh rosemary

1 teaspoon sea salt

1 tablespoon olive oil

4 oz (110g) of Quickes mature cheddar (grated)

Sifting the flour and salt into a large mixing bowl, then sprinkle in the yeast and mix that in. Next pour in 7½ fl oz (210 ml) warm water along with 1½ tablespoons of olive oil and mix everything to a dough that leaves the sides of the bowl clean (if necessary, add a few more drops of water). Now turn the dough out on to a lightly floured surface and knead it for about 10 minutes.

When the dough feels very bouncy and elastic, return it to the bowl, cover with Clingfilm and leave in a warm place until it has doubled in size. I find that 20/30 minutes is normally enough. Turn the dough out and punch the air out by kneading it again for 2-3 minutes.

Take two thirds of the olives and push them evenly into the dough, then you can divide the bread in half or cook it as a whole piece, place the sections on an oiled baking sheet, then using a rolling pin to roll it out into an oblong shape. Next, sprinkle a quarter of the remaining olives.

JOBS TO DO FOR JULY

It's high summer! and the garden should be at it's best, full of colour, sweet smells!

- 1. Water is probably the most important factor this month, not only for the birds but young plants, containers and especially hanging baskets.
- 2. Time to lift early potatoes, garlic and onions.
- 3. Raspberries and currants should be ripening well, gather in before the birds beat you to it!


