

### **National pride**

This month sees the return of the six nations rugby internationals. It is the oldest and largest rugby tournament in the world. It has a one hundred and thirty two year history. It is not an unbroken history, the tournament was stopped by the war and bitter disputes in 1885, 1887 and 1889 prevented its completion. The tournament has grown from the four home nations to include France and Italy. It is interesting that Ireland has remained unified in the tournament despite Ireland's independence.

As you watch the trailers on television you might be forgiven for believing that some giant battle was about to begin. It is portrayed as a battle of epic consequences and importance. It is interesting how a game can unearth a national pride in the nations of the Great Britain, France and Italy. There is talk of greatness and a total belief in the ability of your national team to win all the games. History shows that the games are much closer and less predictable than the exaggerated claims of the supporters. It is hopefully a rivalry that is good natured and lasts only the duration of the game and allows differences to be easily forgotten after the excitement of the game.

It is interesting that the importance of where we have come from, is part of our identity. Where we are born and our parent's nationalities fixes an identity in each of us. It creates a label that tells us and others where we were born and who made us. It is not something we can change, we may be able to delight in it with pride or keep it a secret from others. But when it comes to filling in forms there is no hiding our beginning and identity. However it is an identifier which does not define who we are or what we shall become. That is a whole different story in which we get a big hand to shape it for ourselves.

For me place of birth and parents is very two dimensional. I want to add a third dimension, that of God's creativity. As I look at a new born baby which is both delicate and intricate, I do not think to myself, wow all this comes about by random chance. Instead I marvel at such wonder and complexity. If, as I suggest, there is a third dimension, is it right that we ignore it except perhaps at times of crisis and family obligation? Or should we engage and find out what part we might be able to play in God's plan of forgiveness and grace? Should we pass on to others the very good things that God wants for each of us? It is more important to know where we are going, rather than where we have come from. We can enjoy the excitement of a competition for a short time but what we do each and every day is just as important, if not more important.

The meeting was preceded by the January Draw for the 100 Club in support of the Parish Hall Development Fund. The lucky number was 3 belonging to Jean Thomas.

The Chairman opened the meeting and the minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> December 2013 having been circulated were taken as read and signed as a true copy by the Chairman.

#### **PLANNING**

### **Planning Applications**

The Council discussed the application and there were no objections although it was requested that containers should be positioned singly and not stacked on top of one another.

### **MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION**

#### School Houses

Cllr Reed reported that no work has been carried out since the December meeting due to Christmas and New Year holidays

 West Coast Windows had supplied and installed a new PVC window to the attic bedroom at no 1 and their account has been submitted for payment

- A quotation of £250 for repairs to fencing and gate at rear of the properties has been obtained and this also includes changing downpipes at both properties. It was resolved that this quotation be accepted.
- A quotation has been obtained via Devon
  Lettings for repair work required to the fireplace
  at No 1 and this was referred to be placed on
  hold for further discussion as there seemed to be
  some discrepancy in the work required.
- The new tenancy agreements with Devon Lettings are still in abeyance and the Chairman requested that Cllr Reed ask for these to be agreed as soon as possible.

#### Maintenance of garden area by bus stop

Cllr Nierop reported that Mr Peter Joll has volunteered to undertake this task and the Councillors expressed their thanks on behalf of the community.

#### **MATTERS RAISED BY THE CHAIRMAN**

Cllr Nierop reported on the flooding on the bridge at Nadderwater by the Royal Oak.

Cllr Nierop reported completion of the Land Registry for the Parish Hall and he was awaiting the documents in regard to School Houses and the payment of the account from Foot Anstey for £1,302.00 will be held over until these have been received.

#### **FINANCE**

#### Budget for 2014-2015 and Precept

Balance sheets and documentation regarding finance having been circulated to members were fully discussed and it was resolved that the budget of £19,459 for 2014/15 be adopted and the Precept should remain as at £6,000. Cllr Quinn wished it noted that he was in opposition to the Precept remaining at £6,000 as he thought it should be reduced.

Devon County Council Neighbourhood Highways Officer reported back on the issues raised at the December meeting and also said that it would not be possible for the Parish to erect a sign indicating Nadderwater but if the Parish were happy to fund this they could then arrange for a new one to be erected. Following receipt of this the Clerk had asked for the possible cost of this and received a response to say that it would be somewhere in the region of £300 - £400.

The Clerk had investigated a New Councillors Short Course for Cllr Bramhall to attend and there would be one in Exeter on Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> April at a cost of £25. Cllr Bramhall indicated her willingness to attend on this date and the Council authorised that the Clerk make the necessary booking arrangements

Devon Assn of Local Councils request a nomination of the Chairman to go into a draw to attend a Buckingham Palace Garden Party on Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> June.

#### **REPORTS**

Councillors reported flooding which had occurred in Halsfordwood Lane and on the C50 road by Bondhouse Lane and appreciated how promptly this had been dealt with by Devon Highways.

A pothole was to be reported on the road between Whitestone House and the reservoir and also that the hedge bank is again slipping into the road about ¼ of a mile west of Whitestone in the same area.

### **PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

Mrs Greenfield reported that the pothole in Church Lane have been filled but it would appear to be only a temporary filling as it has degraded already. She also made a request that the grit bin by the Whitestone Church should be replenished in anticipation of the colder/icy weather to come as it is only part full.

Mrs Greenfield gave the following report on the Parish Plan Steering Group:- "We have continued work on the full questionnaire and have further meetings planned for this month. We would like to wish all parishioners a very Happy New Year".

#### THE GREEN CORNER

Peter Melchett, Policy Director of the Soil Association, says that phosphorus is a key ingredient in fertiliser and is essential for farming. Many of us will have heard of N-P-K fertiliser with N for Nitrogen, P for Phosphorus and K for Potassium. Without phosphorus, wheat yields, for example, would fall by half. This is potentially a problem because mineable reserves in China, Morocco and the US are likely to be completely depleted within 100 years, with the "peak Phosphorous" occurring in about 2035.

This no doubt explains why the price of phosphorus has risen 500% since 2007. No doubt it also explains why Thames Water has invested in a plant in Slough to reclaim phosphorus from human sewage. They plan to reclaim 150 tons a year and sell it for £200,000. Piers Clark, their Commercial Director, says phosphorus is a fast depleting resource which we will run out of and that, without it, all life on the planet will take a nosedive. He says using this technology Britain could save 20% of the 150,000 tons we import each year.

Another illustration of the "Where there's muck there's brass" saying?

### WHITESTONE BIRDING

A very happy New Year to everyone and may your gardens be full of birds. Inevitably, at this time of year, the garden becomes a central part of birding. The feeders are busy with goldfinches, greenfinches, house sparrows, blue tits, starlings and coal tits amongst others. The ground below provides a feeding area for dunnock, chaffinch, blackbird and magpie.

I am sure that most of you can identify the tits in the garden but here is a quick run down. The most common two species are the blue tit and the great tit. The blue tit is the little one with a yellow belly, a blue head with white cheeks and a blue looking back. They also have a white wing bar. This species frequently breed in the nest boxes provided by us and, indeed, a pair have already been investigating the webcam box. They are not ready to breed yet but it appears that a pair will find a site that they like and protect it against other interested parties.

The great tit is a much bigger looking bird, although much smaller than the starling or blackbird. The overall impression is a black and yellow bird. The head is black with a blue looking back, white cheeks and a yellow belly. Again, there is a white wing bar. Unlike the blue tit, it is quite easy to sex the great tit. There is a line of black that extends from the chin down the centre of the belly and between the legs. If the black extends all the way across the belly between the legs then the bird is a male. A narrow or invisible line at this point makes the bird a female. The males have started to sing on territory now – a loud and strident 'teacher, teacher' (or weechew, weechew). There are at least three territories on our morning walk. Again, these will nest in man-made boxes as well as natural sites.

Another small tit that is coming to the garden frequently at the moment is the coal tit. This is about the same size as the blue tit although it looks smaller. A small black and grey bird with white cheeks is the first impression but a further look will show a white stripe on the back of the head. In addition this species has two white wing bars but these not always easy to see.

If you are very lucky you will have a marsh tit in the garden. Marginally bigger than the blue tit, this looks black and grey again with huge white cheeks. The outstanding feature is the black cap, totally different from the other tits. The experienced birders amongst you are wondering whether it could be a willow tit. This is very similar and much rarer. There are some in Devon but the habitat here is wrong for them. As suggested, they prefer willow carr in a boggy environment.

And finally, the tiniest of them all – the long tailed tit. Probably one of everyone's favourites. This unmistakable bird is smaller in body than any of the others but has a very long thin tail. Its plumage is totally different to the others with a pinky look to it. Collins Bird Guide describes it in flight as 'a ball with a long tail'. These often travel in small groups and arrive all of a flurry never sitting still for more than a few seconds at a time.

So, having established what we are looking at, are they the same birds coming back all the time? Well, here is some interesting information from four ringing sessions in the garden at the end of 2013.

The table shows blue tit and goldfinch being the most common birds at the feeders. Number of birds ringed in

A retrap is a bird that has been ringed before and is caught again. So, there are quite a number of birds moving through the garden. A quick further note on the subject of ringing. I have just seen a ringed magpie in the garden. As it is ringed on the left leg, the chances are that it was me who ringed it. The only magpie ringed in this garden was on the 17th May 2008 and it was ringed as an adult bird. It would now be at least 8 years old. Looks as though I will have to try and catch it again and let you know whether it is the same bird.

In January, the BTO (British Trust for Ornithology) carried out a week-long survey to investigate what times the first ten species arrive at feeding stations. I did the survey on Wednesday 8th January starting to watch at 7.30 when it was still dark. In order of arrival:

Blue tit	07.50	Chaffinch	08.12
Robin	07.55	Goldfinch	08.17
Great tit	07.56	House sparrow	08.18
Blackbird	08.04	Greenfinch	08.19
Coal tit	08.04	Starling	08.30

It all happened very quickly. Most species arrived in singles or two together but the goldfinch arrived as a flock of 21 which may suggest that there is a roost nearby. Further information on the overall results of the survey can be found on the BTO website.

Outside the garden there is not much to report. In December there was quite a movement of redwing and fieldfare but there are only a few of these around at the moment. This is probably due to the warm weather and a good supply of food so they do not need to move this far south. As yet I have not seen any siskin or brambling in the area, probably for the same reason. A drop in temperature may well change all this so keep looking! The tawny owls are calling with at least three individuals near the centre of the village. A group of 29 pied wagtails were seen amongst sheep in a field along Church Lane on the 4th January. There are regularly a few birds behind the village hall but this is a noteworthy group.

A final note on feeding. At present I am feeding sunflower heart, peanuts and fat balls. The food is being taken but not in the quantity as previous years although there seem to be good numbers of birds present. As a result, there are less feeders out. It is important that the feeders are kept clean. A higher number of dead birds have been reported than usual. Whilst the cause is not definitely known contamination may be a problem. If you see a very fluffed up unhappy looking bird there is little that you can do for it but please do report it on the BTO website as the data is important.

Looking forward to more daylight and greater opportunities for birding just as much as the birds must be looking forward to some drier weather!

The old farmer said, "Well, you know, most Politicians are 'Post Tortoises'."


Not being familiar with the term, the doctor asked him, what a *'Post Tortoise'* was?

#### JANUARY ON THE FARM

The start of the hundred hungry days between Christmas and Easter or the slow beginnings of the new year, the darkness rolling back minute by minute? Both - the start of the hard time, when the whole earth looks scoured by the cold, and look closer, and you see the stirrings of new life, harbinger of the spring to come. The catkin



buds swell, the primrose leaves grow, the snowdrops start to flower, reassurance that the warm time is coming.

The little egrets are back on the cows' fields, beautiful, elegant, shining white. I caught sight of a heron standing motionless in the cold river water, patient and timeless. The bleak river is rich enough for them. The deer get hungry and bolder, eating the kale we've grown for the cows, leaving their slot foot marks over the fields - have we disturbed them or reduced the numbers enough to leave us sufficient food for the cows and a sensible harvest for this year?

**CROPS** - We drilled some barley early, bitten by the difficult weather the previous autumn, and that's a little over proud, and has got battered and fungal - we need a little deer damage to eat back the excess growth. Later drilled wheat looks orderly, that prim look of a well-drilled crop, all the plants in the right place, growing evenly. In the winter fallowed fields, charms of finches flash over, interested in the disturbance I create as I walk.

The fodder beet is coming into its own, feeding dry cows and growing heifers with their fat sweet roots. When we first introduced it to them, they tentatively nibbled the green leaf, and yanked the roots out of the ground. They didn't know what to do with them at first, and started playing with them and kicking them down the hill. They soon caught up with the idea that their football was sweet and yummy – as sweet as sugar beet, with pale golden flesh.

GRASS - Milking cows grazed the grass till Christmas, and now are tucked up in the barn to let the pastures grow back - except on the frozen days, it'll grow a little - 5 kilos of dry matter a hectare a day - that's like five bags of sugar spread over a football pitch including the stands - not much, but it all adds up. The earthworms restore the pastures, smoothing out the hoof marks left from the season's grazing. We've trialled some machines to help break up the compacted layer just under the surface you get with so many hooves going over the ground, and the fields are responding, with rain soaking in more easily.

**COWS** - The autumn cows are in the barn, eating the stored silage - summer time shifted to winter, grass and maize and wheat. Now we make their beds, bring them their food and clear their manure, the hard work of winter. Their milk becomes very rich, with more cheese produced - now taking eight litres to produce a kilo of cheese, rather than closer to ten as we do in the summer. It's rich and sumptuous, deeply buttery.

Less milk, though, with so many cows dry, restoring themselves before calving next month. Less cheese to make, and less cheese to send out, after the rush last month. So now is the time we scrub shelves, mend racks, catch up on cleaning, plan next year, and catch up with our customers to find out how Christmas went. The cheese store, our cathedral of cheese is a little more empty; the cheese gone out on its adventures across the globe for people to enjoy. Now for the New Year, and getting ready to fill the cheese store up again. It's a new year, and we'll keep making the cheese we love, and we hope you enjoy it too!

#### **RECIPE**

My niece Lucy Quicke has come back to the farm - very exciting, and like her mum, she's a great cook. She gave me this 'Very Simple Quickes Omelette'

#### Ingredients:

Cooking butter, 1 tablespoon
Frozen peas, 1 handful
Leek, one quarter, chopped,
Closed cup mushrooms, 4 sliced
Red & yellow pepper, one quarter, chopped
Garlic clove, crushed
Eggs, 4
Semi skimmed milk, dash
Quickes Ex Mat Cheddar, large handful, grated

#### Method:

Heat the butter in a pan and add leek, peas, mushrooms, peppers and garlic. Sauté for 5 minutes. Whisk the eggs and milk together and mix in the cheese. Pour over the vegetables and cook for a few minutes until golden brown underneath. Place under a preheated grill for a further 5 minutes and serve immediately.

After Christmas, I need some easy recipes for party exhaustion, and this one just fits the bill. Happy New Year, and keeping loving cheese!


