

When is Easter?

I was asked the other day "how is the date of Easter decided?" My initial response was with great difficulty, there is a repeating pattern that repeats every 5.7 million years! Then the simple answer is that it is linked to the full moon which would have been around at the time of Jesus' death. Then the more complicated answer, Easter is set on the Sunday following the full moon after the spring equinox. That seems quite simple but when we try to put it into practice it is not quite so simple. The spring equinox can occur on 20th and 21st March. The full moon was set on 14th day of the lunar month. The church wanted to predict Easter so set the spring equinox on 21st March (sadly they picked in AD325 the least frequent day of the two!) and then worked out the date of Easter. So Easter is set on a predicted full moon not an observed full moon.

You might ask why are we so worried about the full moon? Jesus celebrated the Passover meal the night before he died. The Passover meal was celebrated by Jews on the first full moon of Spring. Hence the lunar connection to Easter. So what is the Passover? It remembers when Moses led God's people out of slavery in Egypt across the parted waters of the Red Sea. That night was also a full moon which would have made an escape in the middle of the night much easier. The word Passover comes from when the angel of death 'passed over' the Jewish households but visited the Egyptian households killing every first born child and animal. This last disaster persuaded the Pharaoh to let God's people go. The Passover remembers God setting his people free from slavery in Egypt.

Easter remembers Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday. It marks a new chapter in human history where there is new evidence for life after death. A new and restored relationship with God is celebrated. Is it just coincidence that Jesus dies after the Passover feast? Is it coincidence that God's first born son should die to set us free from death? Unsurprisingly I am more of a believer in God incidence than coincidence. God acts to bring about a remarkable change rather than it being random chance.

So back to Easter Day, Sunday 20th April 2014. The paschal full moon by the calculated method is Monday 14th April. The observed full moon will be 15th April at 8.45am. Hence at the beginning of Holy Week on Monday night / Tuesday morning, look out for the full moon if the sky is clear. The full moon reminded the Jewish people of their flight from slavery in Egypt. Jesus freely gives up his life at the full moon so that we might all share in his eternal life. Easter Day was the day after the Jewish Sabbath (Saturday). That is why Christians keep Sunday special because it reminds us of Easter Day.

SUSTAINABLE WHITESTONE

Do you feel a nasty chill as you walk past that window where the curtains or blinds flutter gently on a cold and blustery winter's evening?

Maybe this is just the worst of a whole series of sneaky gaps you are not even aware of that allow cold draughts in to eat away at the warm air inside. If so, what does this mean for your fuel bill as the boiler works overtime to keep up - not to mention the waste of precious energy resources?

Whitestone and Crediton householders had the opportunity to face some home truths like these in February when Brian Harper of Malvern Hills Transition Group carried out thermographic surveys on their homes.

To get a fully comprehensive feedback on what you need to do to keep the draughts at bay, Brian asks you to turn your heating off and close all windows for an hour before his visit. He then installs a large fan set in a sealed plastic sheet over an outside door which sucks internal air outwards, allowing draughts in with a big rush wherever they can.

Brian tracks down the culprits in every corner of the building using portable thermal imaging equipment, accompanied by the householder holding an attached screen. The image on the screen highlights all cold areas in tell-tale black and the householder is encouraged to put a hand across these to feel the draughts, made unmistakable by the outward suction rom the door. The imaging process also highlights cold walls and ceilings which give away poor insulation.

As he carries out the survey, Brian gives a running commentary on his findings so, at the end, the house-holder is presented with a CD providing a full visual and aural record of what needs to be done to make the house as draught proof and well-insulated as it can possibly be. The whole process takes about an hour, depending on the size of the house.

In my 1930s house, there were no big surprises, but it helped to have the uncomfortable facts recorded literally in black and white. A house this age falls into the one quarter of 22 million homes nationwide that are classed as "difficult to insulate". There is no cavity wall insulation for instance and the old fashioned latches on original windows do not secure the frames strongly enough to keep out the draughts. But the good news is that thick loft insulation kept the ceilings at the whiter end of the spectrum on the imaging screen.

Along with the CD, householders are lent a conveniently portable electricity monitoring system so they can get to grips with their consumption (see Green Corner) and thermometers to check room temperatures (useful if like mine your central heating thermostats don't specify temperatures).

Overall, the process gives the householder confidence that an energy-efficient home can be an achievable goal. Once any remedial work is carried out, there could even be a financial bonus for those thinking of selling their homes.

Surveys can only be carried out in winter, but now is the time to organise one for later in the year.



DRAFT Minutes of Whitestone Parish Council meeting held at Whitestone Parish Hall at 7.30pm on Thursday, 13th March 2014.

The meeting was preceded by the March Draw for the 100 Club in support of the Parish Hall Development Fund. The lucky number was 80 belonging to Paul Harvey.

The Chairman opened the meeting and the minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 13th February 2014 having been circulated were taken as read and signed as a true copy by the Chairman.

PLANNING

Grant of Conditional Planning Permission 13/01685/FUL Relocate access and associated new drive at Chants Cottage, Heath Cross.

Councillor Heathcote declared an interest in the following Notification of Appeal for Rebecca Springs.

Notification of Appeal against refusal of Outline Planning Permission for dwelling at Rebecca Springs, Nadderwater.

No comments were noted as these had been forwarded when the application was made in December 2013.

MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION

School Houses

Cllr Reed reported that Devon Sales and Lettings have now completed their Tenancy Agreements for the Houses and both he and Cllr Hickman had gone through them and all the Parish Council concerns have been noted and covered. It was resolved that these can now be presented to the tenants for signing. It was reported that the fan oven at No 1 has had to be replaced. It was noted that the electrical inspection for No 2 was now due and Devon Sales and Lettings would be obtaining prices for this and arrangements were being made for the Sweep to go back and check on the fireplace at No 1. Cllr Hickman raised some concerns and said that he hoped that the new tenancy agreements would clear up some minor issues that he had noted on a recent inspection. A vote of thanks was passed to Cllr Reed and Cllr Hickman for their contribution in this matter.

REPORT FROM COUNTY COUNCLLOR

County Councillor Brook gave his report as he wished to leave early. He reported on the Devon County budget and mentioned the consultations that were being held with regard to Youth Services and Old Peoples' Homes being passed to the private sector. Discussion took place regarding these issues and also with the situation regarding road repairs with Councillors passing on their views. Cllr Brook then left the meeting.

MATTERS FOR DISCUSSION

Electors Fund

Requests for applications for grants had been submitted by various organisations within the Parish and following discussion of these it was resolved, with one abstention, that an application from the Electors Fund be made for a Zoll AED Plus defibribrillator at a cost of £900. This would be based at the Parish Hall and the Parish Hall Management Committee has expressed the intention of taking the lead and offering specific training in its use, together with general CPR, to persons/groups so interested for the benefit of the parish.

<u>Proposed Public Path Diversion Order Bridleway No 14</u> Notification of this was discussed and it was agreed that it would be an improvement for riders.

Crossway Park

Cllr Phillips reported that he and Cllr Fisher had inspected the equipment and he had noted that the Trim Trail was unsafe and a notice and tape had been placed saying that it should not be used. It was resolved that Cllr Phillips obtain some quotes and arrange for the repair work to be done. It had been reported that the chains on the swings were a risk and this is being investigated. The gate going into the play area is not closing and Cllr Munro will investigate this.

Footpath sign Parish Hall

Cllr Munro reported that he had mended this and a vote of thanks was given to him.

Nadderwater signs

These signs are still under investigation.

Drainage Survey

This report has been sent to the relevant department and Cllr Nierop expressed his thanks to the Councillors and members of the public for their assistance in compiling this.

Cllr Nierop asked for volunteers for a "Litter Pick" organised for Saturday 29th March 10am at the Parish Hall.

Request from Whitestone Parish Hall Committee for Rural Aid Grant

The Committee are undertaking a combined project for a suspended ceiling and cavity wall insulation at a cost of £2,206.75 of which they would pay £1,106.75 together with additional costs of minor electrical work and woodworm treatment. They are asking for an application to Rural Aid for the sum of £1,100 and it was resolved that this request be put in place.

MATTERS RAISED BY THE CHAIRMAN

Cllr Belt reported receipt of notification of a meeting/ AGM of the Teignbridge Neighbourhood Watch Association to be held on 9th April 2014. At the present time there are no Neighbourhood Watch officers within the parish.

Clerk's expenses/quarterly salary

- Information received from Teignbridge District Council that they will be arranging the Rural Skip Service for Saturday 10th May 2014 at Hill Lane Junction from 10am to 4pm.
- Mr P Bartley wrote to say he had incurred no costs in carrying out the repairs to the pump at Nadderwater and the Councillors again reiterated thanks for the work he had done.
- The resident at Merrymeet responded to a letter regarding the setting up of a dog walking/kennels business saying that owing to ill health she would not be carrying this venture forward and would be removing the website which had been set up to advertise this undertaking.
- Whitestone Parish Hall Committee of Management reported that their AGM will be held in the Parish Hall at 7pm on Tuesday 6th May 2014 and requested the name of the person nominated to represent the Parish Council on the Committee for the 2014/15 year. It was resolved that Cllr Belt's name should be put forward. It was noted that, subsequent to the resignation of Mrs Hanson, all booking enquiries for the Hall after 1st April should be made to Mrs P Fisher.

REPORTS

Potholes and subsidence were reported on the road to Oldridge (on the double bend), Church Cross to Trowbridge, Hill Lane (subsidence and potholes), Pound Lane (subsidence and potholes).

Cllr Hickman asked if the last bus which leaves Tedburn at 1853 could possibly stop to pick up within Whitestone Parish on way to Exeter – arriving at 1915. At the present time this bus does not stop but does pass through. The Clerk to contact Devon County.

Concerns were raised regarding the parking of vehicles in Merrymeet causing obstruction to residents.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Mrs Sheila Greenfield gave a very comprehensive update on the progress of the Parish Plan Steering Group. She stated that developing the questionnaire [which will be circulated to all parishioners] is fundamental to the Parish Plan process and that it has been a very iterative process. It has been important to word the questions in a clear, fair and unambiguous manner and in a way that would allow a relatively easy analysis of responses. The responses will then be taken forward to produce statistics and outcomes for the Final Plan and Action Plan. During development of the questionnaire, the Group has had supportive assistance from the Community Council for Devon, Teignbridge District Council and individual members of

the Parish. Feedback from these parties has been very positive.

In answer to questions from Cllr Hickman, she stated that she was reluctant at this stage, to give a specific timetable for the completion of the each of the various stages leading up to publication of the Final Plan. She was, however, happy to explain that the Group will be shortly sending the final version of the questionnaire off to be 'converted' from a physical questionnaire into a format that would also be suitable for both operating over and being accessible via the internet. Both versions must preserve the respondent's anonymity. The aim will be to allow parishioners to respond either via return of a completed paper questionnaire or to send on-line response if they prefer. She assured the meeting that the Group is taking all reasonable precautions to ensure that the whole exercise is worthwhile.

The Chairman thanked Mrs Greenfield for her report and the meeting closed at 9.20pm

THE GREEN CORNER

Those who had an infra-red survey of their houses carried out last month were also loaned a pack of useful things to help them save energy. One of the most useful of these was a hand-held electricity meter which monitors how much electricity your house is using at any one time. You can walk around the house switching things on and off and see how much electricity each is using.

What's surprising though is how hard it is to get the meter to read zero. Even with no fridges, freezers, lights, heating pumps or anything obvious at all on, our meter wouldn't go below about 45 to 50 watts. Given that every watt costs about £1.30 for a year, 50 watts would cost about £65.

After a bit of research we found out what was consuming these extra watts. Some things you wouldn't want to ever switch off anyway - things like the mains powered smoke alarm (5 watts), door bell transformer (4 watts), Broadband (5 watts), cordless phone charger (2 watts), infra-red detectors for security lights (4x5watts).

There were some surprises though - for example the electric oven used 10 watts, the food mixer (plugged in and switched on at the socket) used 4watts, the washing machine 2 watts, microwave 3 watts and even the toaster was using 2 watts! The TV and digibox together used 9 watts.

So it seems as though anything that has electronic controls is likely to be using power all the time but things like a kettle that just have an on/off switch shouldn't. So if you can switch something off at the wall socket without causing difficulties, it's a good habit to get into.

THE HEALTH CORNER STUDIES SHOW WALKS CAN DELAY BRAIN DECLINE

A recent report to the American Association for the Advancement of Science said that studies on men and woman aged 60 to 80 showed that taking a short walk three times a week increased the size of the parts of the brain concerned with planning and memory loss.

100 adults were recruited who confessed to taking little if any exercise in their daily lives. They were split into two groups- one doing 30 to 45 minutes of walking three days week and the other doing stretching exercises for the same amount of time over the period of a year.

The scientist in charge said "The pre-frontal cortex is involved in a lot of higher level cognitive functions and the hippocampus is involved in memory formation which, when it shrinks, leads to Alzheimer's disease and dementia." He said there's no cure yet for dementia but exercise could slow the rate of decline.

Another good reason for getting a dog!

MARCH ON THE FARM

The whole world has had exceptional weather - non-stop rain here and in Europe, deep freeze in North America, drought in California, Australia and Brazil, weather whipped into a frenzy by warmer oceans. Farmers around the world are reliant on the weather doing what it's always done, the seasons being in the right place, seed time and harvest at the right



time. That was so important that our ancestors built Stonehenge to tell them the time of year so they would know when to do what to feed themselves. So what to do when the weather is so extreme?

Clear up the damage, for one. Our 30 year old eucalyptus fell, all 88 feet of it, roots ripped from wet soil, just glancing our fruit cage. Owls hoot less frequently they hunt by sound, so wind and rain leave them hungry, maybe starving. We found a dead buzzard by a broken electricity line - did it break it, or kill itself chasing a leaping spark from the live wire. Spare a thought, and some cash, for those farmers on the Somerset levels, who spent a second winter under water, to help them recover. It's heartwarming to see how the whole country has leant in and supported them. If we were in that much trouble, we'd want the world to think of us. Our Farm Manager Adam informed me that out 10 year average for rainfall was 2.5 inches, last month alone we had 8 inches. I have attached a link at the end of my diary for anyone who wants to give to the Somerset appeal helping those affected by the flooding.

I can't help thinking when the weather turns, our wishes for dry and sun will be answered with a drought; weather reverts to the mean.

CROPS - It's been warm all winter, and the crops are growing, although their roots are waterlogged. March often gives brisk east winds and dry. The crops want gentle dry, to allow their roots to breathe and chase the water though the soil profile. We will feed the crops, which turns them from yellowing and straggly to green and thriving as if we've taken a paintbrush to them.

GRASS - We'll wave the same magic paintbrush over the grass, either with flood water (other people's nutrients), dilute slurry from our very full slurry lagoon (all the manure, whey, dairy washings and a lot of rain), or a bag. The cows went out later than usual 2nd March, waiting for the floodwater to subside. We had to buy extra silage to feed animals before the grass grew. Now we wait for 'magic day', when the grass growth is more than the cows can eat, we hope that comes by the end of March. Then we know spring is here.

COWS & YOUNGSTOCK - This was the first year we have out wintered the youngstock and dry cows. This is part of us working to get ways of keeping our animals that are stable against whatever shocks the weather throws at us. The simpler the system, the more leeway you have.

The calves thrived on kale and silage, out all winter.

They are growing faster than last year's calves kept inside, and were noticeably healthier - no pneumonia. They grew long woolly coats, and looked happy. We move them every day, so no part of the field gets unduly damaged. That field will go into a spring crop, maize or spring barley later this month.

Their teenage sisters looked happy and equally woolly on our clovery grass. Again, they move on daily, and the grass has recovered - they will go back to the beginning and eat what they grazed in early winter

The dry cows and in-calf heifers were out on the fodder beet. They were nourished adequately by the beet, plus a few silage bales. Those cows are calving now in March, and their almost hibernation in the mud has created toned pelvic muscles and healthy calves. Again, those fields will go to a spring crop this month.

The new calves are thick on the ground, blarting after milk, out as soon as we know they are drinking well, starting on their outdoor lives that their breeding fits them for.

CHEESE - And the new grass-fed milk comes through, yellow and rich in flavour, steaming vats for the cheesemakers to transform in that daily miracle, taking milk, heritage starter, rennet and an age old recipe to make glorious flavours.

RECIPE - Stephen Willett's Quicke's cheese tart

There are 4 elements to this tart: the pastry, the soufflé, the cheese sauce (embedded in the base) and the salad accompaniment. Stephen has given links - look them up or go to www.quickes.co.uk. For best results, please view the videos on YouTube (www.youtube.co.uk).

1) A rough puff pastry base.

250 gm each of butter and flour, which is about the minimum quantity that works. You will then need only half of that pastry for the base. Use a dinner plate to cut out a round of pastry rolled to 3 mm, and flip it onto a baking sheet. For a tartlet, you will need to use a smaller plate to score the pastry half way through to make a lid-like a large vol-au-vent. Prick the pastry before baking at 180°C for 20 minutes until light golden.

- 2) "Raymond Blanc's Comte cheese souffle". Please see YouTube video. This sauce uses double cream, a handful of Quicke's Cheddar, an optional shot of kirsch, and light seasoning including cayenne pepper. Allow this to cool slightly before pouring and spreading into the pastry base and replacing the 2 halves of the lid.
- 3) The souffle mix: 300ml thick bechamel sauce seasoned with a good tea-spoon of Dijon mustard, enriched with 2 egg yolks. add to this a good handful of grated cheddar and stir over a low heat until the sauce is smooth. The consistency must be just readily dropping from a spoon. Pour out over the pastry case, there will be some left over, bake to a good dark brown...you need a good crust to support the soufflé.
- 4) The vegetable accompaniment (pan seared chicory and chinese lettuce, with oven roasted baby plum tomatoes, a few basil leaves all dressed with olive oil and balsamic vinegar or vincotta) is served at room temperature, and can be prepared while cooling your cooked pastry base.
