



The next Quarter of the 21st Century

The start of 2025 signifies the next quarter century of this third millennium. Seeing how much has changed in the last twenty-five years is amazing. The biggest change is technology, particularly mobile phones and internet access. We do not tend to buy physical things like music and films; we download them now. We now have smart televisions and many streaming services, and recording live television programmes is a rare event. Twenty-five years ago, we were worried that the computers would stop working because the year 2000 was not programmed into the year field! Sadly, young people seem to be under more pressure and we are concerned with their wellbeing. Loneliness and isolation particularly with older people are still causing much concern. We all want to address some of these shortcomings to improve life for both young and old. Another major concern is climate change, we see direct evidence of the changes in flooding most recently in Valencia and prolonged heatwaves in Europe with the threat of wildfires. On a more positive note, we see many electric cars, low-emission zones, and power coming from renewable energy sources such as solar and wind farms. There is still a long way to go to make the necessary changes.

We often signify twenty-five years with silver, so we have silver wedding anniversaries and we have become accustomed to the multiple jubilees in the Queen's long reign, we had silver, gold, diamond and incredibly platinum. King Charles' Silver Jubilee would be 2049 and he would be ninety-nine years old. That seems a long way off at the moment! When I started working at my first company it used to have long service awards when you had served the company for twenty years. That seemed impossibly long to me aged just twenty-one. These achievements are rightly celebrated as significant milestones but the journey continues and we have to keep striving to work at our commitments and responsibilities. Sometimes, these milestones are useful for looking back and seeing how far we have moved forward and perhaps remembering some of the good highlights during that time.

The church looks at what makes Jesus special in January in the season of Epiphany. We discover that Jesus can transform difficult situations, take ordinary things and make them special, and restore broken relationships. These relationships are not one-dimensional in isolation. It is not just about my relationship with God. Jesus makes clear how we relate to other people has a bearing on how we can relate to God. We are called to help others rather than focus on helping ourselves. As we look around the world, many places need light and hope.





Whitestone GARDEN CLUB by Antony Galton

In Flanders and Swann's charming (and touching) ditty 'Misalliance', which was performed recently by a group of us at the Parish Hall, reference is made to 'the Bindweed, or Convolulus to give her proper name' — which prompts the question, in what way is Convolvulus a more proper name than Bindweed? Of course there are plenty of situations in which the use of scientific names of plants is important, indeed necessary, but in most everyday situations the use of common English names is more appropriate, and it seems a pity not to avail ourselves of the wealth of often colourful and expressive English names on offer. There is a tendency though, particularly among gardening folk, to neglect the good old English names in favour of botanical Latin, and I do find this somewhat regrettable. Why talk about Acer, Antirrhinum, Aquilegia, Potentilla, and Veronica when we have at our disposal such lovely names as Maple, Snapdragon, Columbine, Cinquefoil, and Speedwell?

Well, there are reasons we might do this. One is if we want to distinguish between different species of the same genus, for which well-established common names may not exist. There are about 130 different species of Aquilegia, any which can be called a columbine, and quite a few of them are available for growing in gardens. Some of them do have good English names. Our native *Aquilegia vulgaris* is the Common Columbine; the European alpine *A. alpina* is, not surprisingly, the Alpine Columbine; and *A. canadensis* is Canadian Columbine, though naturally enough in Canada it is known simply as Wild Columbine, or Eastern Red Columbine (there is a Western Red Columbine as well). And this is one of the problems with English names: in some cases there are simply too many of them, and in other cases none at all. Looking down the list of Aquilegia species in Wikipedia, I find, for example, *A. borodinii* from Siberia and Mongolia; no English name is given, though it would be easy enough to make one up – Borodin's Columbine, say – and one finds plenty of such made-up names in the literature, modelled on the Latin name but never actually used much.

Another problem is that the English names are often ambiguous. I remember my father telling me that when as a boy he stayed on a Devon farm, one of the local children told him that a certain wild flower was called Bird's Eye. Now what plant was that? It is impossible to tell. Consulting the index of Geoffrey Grigson's splendid 1955 book 'The Englishman's Flora', I find no less than 16 references to Bird's Eye: in different parts of England this name has been applied variously to Cuckoo Flower, Wild Pansy, Red Campion, Chickweed, Greater Stitchwort, Pearlwort, Herb Robert, Bird's-foot Trefoil, Scarlet Pimpernel, Bird's-eye Primrose, Forget-me-not, Brooklime, Germander Speedwell, and Ground Ivy. Of these, only Bird's-eye Primrose (*Primula farinosa*) – which doesn't grow in Devon – retains the bird's eye in its standard English name, although one quite often encounters Bird's-eye Speedwell as an alternative name for Germander Speedwell (*Veronica chamaedrys*). In general, amongst the plethora of local vernacular names for any plant, one or two of them have become elevated to the status of standard English names. There are plenty of cases where there are at least two vying for this accolade, witness Cuckoo Flower vs Lady's Smock, Cuckoo Pint vs Lords-and-Ladies, Gorse vs Furze vs Whin, Goosegrass vs Cleavers, Thrift vs Sea Pink, and so on.

And then there are the confusions that can result when a supposedly standard name gets misapplied. Take Mare's Tail, for example. The floras all agree that this name belongs to an attractive, if understated, water plant, *Hippurus vulgaris*, with upright emergent leafy stems and tiny purple flowers, a welcome addition to any pond. But it has also become widely used to apply to a pernicious weed, *Equisetum arvense*, whose official English name is Horsetail; it is a relative of the ferns and spreads by means of tough rhizomes that can penetrate several feet underground and is a devil to get rid of. So what is the 'correct' use of the name Mare's Tail? I'm not sure that this is an entirely meaningful question, but since Equisetum already has a perfectly good English name – Horsetail – and Hippurus has no widely used alternative, we should surely encourage the use of Mare's Tail for the latter in preference to the former.



Chair invited comments and Councillors noted that considerations should be given to materials, lighting and wildlife boxes. Cllr Taylor commented about the impact of galvanized roofings and visual impact when the sun reflects off the surface and suggested that consideration should be given to a treated surface to reduce glare. Councillor Evans had prepared a draft response and all Councillors unanimously agreed to support this application.

Next walk—Sunday 5th January 2025

Meet at Whitestone Parish Hall at 9.30am or at venue by 10.30am. Please note that at the time of writing, sections of the main route out of Chagford to Fernworthy will be closed from 4th January 2025. If travelling from Whiddon Down on the A382, I suggest taking the right hand junction near West Withecombe. It may be sign-posted Murchington/ Chagford? Continu towards Chagford but after passing through a section with a very narrow bridge and lane (7ft), continue straight on at the next crossroads, ignoring any directions into Chagford. Look for signs to Fernworthy Reservoir (TQ13 8EA).

The walk will be around the reservoir. Stout walking boots or shoes should be worn as there will be some short muddy sections and a couple of uphill sections. The main part of the walk is about 3 miles but there will be an option of an additional loop of about 11/2 miles. There should be hot beverages and food available at the mobile shop near the end of the main walk.

PARKING:

Travel time from Whitestone is about 40 minutes. As you drive into the forested area around the reservoir, you will see a sign to the toilets/main car park on the right. Do not take this, continue on the single track road for around 1/4 mile until you see a large workshop/ barn building on the left with parking next to it. Alternatively, there is parking on the other side of the road on a grassed area. (What Three Words: profile, spelled, steam).
