

#### FROM THE RECTOR

### Remembering the end of World War Two

This August sees the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of World War Two. The Japanese finally surrendered on 14 August 1945, following the dropping of the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the Soviet declaration of war and the invasion of Manchuria. The next day, Wednesday 15 August 1945, was celebrated as VJ (Victory over Japan) Day. The British and Commonwealth campaign in the Far East was the longest war campaign, fighting raged for three full years. Unlike their comrades fighting in Europe, the British Forces had no leave during which they could go home, even for just a few days. They were there for the duration of the war; their only hope of seeing England was in victory. Life was extremely hard for the Allied Far East Prisoner of War (FEPOW). The prison camps became infamous for the harsh treatment administered to their inmates. Food was strictly rationed – many men had a little rice and boiled river water. All the prisoners suffered with diseases such as malaria, beriberi and dysentery. Despite their weakened state, the men were put to work as forced labour. The 258-mile Thailand-Burma railway construction, also known as the Death Railway, was the most notorious.

It is sobering to think that the atomic bombs that were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki are estimated to have killed instantly over 140,000 people, and about the same number were injured. However, they had been exposed to very high levels of radiation, and the majority would die from radiation sickness.

The national commemorations will begin at midday on 15 August 2025. A service will be held at the Far East Prisoner of War Memorial Building at the National Memorial Arboretum, and a wreath laying and blessing at the Far East Prisoners of War Grove will follow.

This anniversary is a sombre reminder of the human cost of war and the tragic events that leave deep scars in the memories of the survivors of the war. Despite these harsh realities, people seem very able and willing to take up arms against others and even repeat acts of genocide. Edmund Burke said

"The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing."

At the heart of God is a demonstration of love that stands up against evil and delights in goodness. It relies on people doing good to transform the dark parts of our world. It is goodness that triumphs rather than might, and it relies on many people acting out of love. The events of eighty years ago are a timely reminder of what happens when people make war rather than peace. There is still so much death and destruction in our world. We need to keep looking for the good in people.



#### **Bus Service 173**

When road works on the Tedburn side of Heath Cross blocked the Whitestone & Nadderwater road to Exeter, the bus service had to be cancelled (21 - 25 July). In is place, a taxi service was provided at certain times on this route as long as this service was booked the day before.

We are told that more roadworks are planned, this time at the top of Redhills, This will mean that the road to Exeter will be blocked for 3½ months from: Tuesday 2nd September to Friday 19 December 2025



#### WHITESTONE BOOK CLUB Review - July 2025

Don't Look Now by Daphne du Maurier (1971)

This is a collection of five stories of suspense, mystery and slow, creeping horror.

In 'Don't Look Now' John and Laura visit Venice to try and escape the pain of their young daughter's tragic death. They meet two sisters, one of whom claims to have second sight, and become caught up in a train of increasingly strange and violent events.

It is disturbing read, and sets the tone for the other stories. It has a strong sense of place, using the architecture and water Venice is famous for.

In 'Not After Midnight', a lonely teacher on holiday in Crete investigates a mysterious American couple - again this transports the reader to a hot summer on the coast and is unsettling and violent.

'A Border Line Case' opens with the harrowing death scene, and a young woman investigates her father's past and his associations with the IRA. The story is set in Ireland but we all felt it was unrealistic.

'The Way of the Cross' was our favourite read, it had humour, great characters, and an interesting plot. Set in Jerusalem, it accurately describes the place and atmosphere - confirmed by one of readers who has visited the same locations.

In 'The Breakthrough' a scientist claims to be able to trap the soul at the point of death. We agreed this was a chilling story about scientists crossing an ethical line. Set on the windswept coast of rural Suffolk, it is atmospheric but with an unrealistic plot. A science fiction story that tackles subjects of morality and experimentation and made us reflect on the current Al debates.


We had a lively discussion, with very mixed views. We agreed the writing was good but dated and used terms that would not used today. Several members did not finish the book at it was too disturbing.

Daphne du Maurier (1907-89) is best known for 'Jamaica Inn (1936), Rebecca (1938), and The Birds (1952), all filmed by Hitchcock. 'Don't Look Know' filmed in 1973 to critical acclaim is available on the BBC i Player.

At our next meeting on August 11th we will review The Island of the Sea Women by Lisa See.

# Garden Jobs for August – Tips for Whitestone Gardeners

August is a glorious month in the garden—full of colour, buzzing pollinators, ripening fruit, and long, warm evenings to enjoy your hard work. But while it might seem like a time to sit back and relax, there are still plenty of tasks to keep your garden looking its best through late summer and into autumn.

Here are some timely tips tailored for gardens here in Whitestone:

#### Flower Garden

Deadhead Regularly: Keep bedding plants and perennials like cosmos, dahlias, and roses flowering by removing faded blooms.

Support Tall Plants: Late-flowering perennials such as asters and heleniums may need staking to protect them from wind or heavy rain.

Divide Bearded Irises: If your irises have become crowded, lift and divide them now so they establish before winter.

Sow Biennials: Foxgloves, wallflowers, and sweet williams can be sown now for strong flowering next spring.

#### Fruit & Veg Plot

Harvest Frequently: Pick beans, courgettes, cucumbers, and tomatoes regularly to encourage more growth.

Feed Hungry Crops: Tomatoes and courgettes benefit from a weekly potash-rich liquid feed.

Keep Watering: Especially in dry spells, water crops deeply and early in the day or evening to reduce evaporation.

Net Autumn Fruit: Use mesh to protect ripening plums, apples, and pears from birds.

Plant Winter Brassicas: Kale, cabbage, and purple sprouting broccoli can still go in the ground.

#### **General Maintenance**

Lawn Care: Mow regularly, but raise the blade slightly in dry weather. Consider sowing new grass in bare patches later in the month.

Weed Control: Don't let annual weeds go to seed—pull them out while still young.

Hedge Trimming: Give privet, laurel, and box hedges a final tidy-up before growth slows in autumn.

Composting: Turn compost heaps and add grass clippings and veg waste to keep the pile active and healthy.

#### Wildlife Friendly Tips

Top Up Bird Baths: Keep them clean and topped up, especially during hot spells.

Avoid Over-Tidying: Leave seed heads and some faded flowers to provide food and shelter for insects and birds.

Plant Late-Summer Nectar Sources: Sedum, echinacea, and verbena bonariensis are all great for bees and butterflies.

#### **Local Tip: Prepare for Autumn**

August is a transition month—start thinking about bulbs for spring (order now!) and plan space for overwintering crops or new shrubs. If you're lucky enough to have a greenhouse, it's also a great time to clean it out ahead of autumn sowing.



**43.** Cllr Baird opened the meeting and the minutes of the Council Meeting held on 12th June 2025 having been circulated were taken as read and signed by the Chair.

#### 44. REPORT FROM DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

District Councillor Parrott reported on various matters and stated that there will be a Planning Forum to discuss local government reorganization being held at Tedburn St Mary Village Hall from 6pmto 8pm on 15th July.

#### 45. PLANNING

- 45.1 25/00887/AGR Agricultural building at at Redwood Grove Whitestone. The Council has discussed and considered this planning application. However, as the Council was not formally asked to provide a response we have not done so. The Council would like to note that there is a lack of information in the current application.
- 45.2 25/00932/NPA Application for a Prior Approval under Part 3 Class Q (a) and (c) and paragraph W of the GDPO for change of use of an agricultural building to two dwellings at Merry View Whitestone. The Council discussed and considered this planning application. However as the Council was not formally asked to provide a response we have not done so.
- 45.3 95/02040/AMD2 non material amendment to amend the design of the approved extension to No.2.Cleave Cottage to planning permission 95/02040 (2 storey extensions to form additional living accommodation, porches, garages and extra garden) at 2 Cleave Cottage Whitestone.. The Council reviewed this application and noted that there was no requirement for the Council to respond as the application had already been resolved by Teignbridge District Council.
- 45.4 24/00503/COND2 Discharge of Condition 5 (Treatment Plan) on Planning Permission 24/00503/FUL for installation of four glamping pods for overnight guest use, associated decking footpaths, parking and turning area, storage hut, secure bicycle storage and recycling/refuse storage and associated works at Oak Tree Farm. The Parish Council discussed and considered this planning application and has noted the update regarding the drainage and have no further comments.
- 45.5 25/01044/FUL Construction of a new farm building and farm access at Rowhorne Farm, Nadderwater. Following discussions and consideration of the planning application at the Whitestone Parish Council meeting, the Council has the following comments. The following changes are proposed:-
- The inclusion of bat and owl boxes are encouraged to improve the environmental impact of the structure.

• We would like the usage of more environmentally friendly materials such as hempboard are utilised to reduce carbon emissions of the building.

The Council makes an effort to represent the interests of the Parish in this Planning Application response but we encourage members of the community to post individual issues or challenges with this proposed development directly on the planning forum. This document is

provided to Teignbridge District Council in accordance with Section 293G of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990. It is for the Teignbridge District Council Planning Officer / Planning Committee and we leave the final decision to Teignbridge District Council.

Considerations made by WPC are provided based on the following information:

- National Planning Policy Framework.
- Local Parish Development Plan and Parish knowledge.
- Planning Material Considerations.
- Non-material Considerations that contribute to Material Considerations.

Construction Considerations - While construction disruption is not a material consideration, the proposed building construction will potentially cause environmental damage that should be considered as a part of the whole -life cycle of the building.

- Excavations Owing to the site position, there is the likelihood for excavations to create a site onto which the structure will be placed. Construction must include adequate cut and fill analysis to prevent export of topsoil.
- Construction Traffic Issues of usage of local roads must be informed to users of the site during construction. Environmental Material Considerations
- Noise There are limited noise considerations as a result of this development beyond current noise levels in the site.
- Air Quality The development is not projected to cause detriment to the air quality of the area.
- Biodiversity Impacts Included in the application is the proposal for the planting of wild flower meadows, orchards and shrubs. This is will be of benefit to the area and is encouraged by the WPC. Further schemes could include owl and bat boxes.
- Light The side panels on the structure may cause light pollution. Therefore, information could be provided to the Council on the usage of the site at night and lighting to be installed to minimise light pollution.
- Land Pollution N/A for this application.
- Materials in Construction The use of concrete for the side panels is not as environmentally sustainable as the usage of timber. A potential change of the design to minimise concrete usage or include cement substitutes (where possible) is recommended.
- Biodiversity Net Gain The overall development will not cause significant environmental damage in conclusion.
- Economic Material Considerations
- Local Business This application is a proposal to expand an agricultural business and support the rural economy. This will bring an economic benefit to the local area.

**Community Impact Material Considerations** 

- Appearance and Design The proposed barn structure is a traditional agricultural building and is in keeping with surrounding structures and the agricultural character of the area.
- Visual Impact It should be noted the new building will cause a limited amount of loss of existing farmland as a result. This has been considered in the application and mitigated against. Owing to the position of the site at the top of a hill, this will cause a visual impact.

- Loss of Privacy The building is unlikely to cause issues of loss of privacy of existing buildings in the area.
- Heritage Assets There is to be no impact on heritage structures in the Parish as seen in the application.
- Flood Risk / Drainage Site is not in a flood risk area.
   The implementation of rain water collection systems in the planning application is to be a positive for preventing run-off issues on the site. This is encouraged by the WPC.
- Highways The proposed access point to the site will involve a double galvanised steel gate. This is deemed to provide adequate access to the site and is in-keeping with the area.
- Transport The proposal to link education and tourism to farming will likely generate a small amount of traffic as a result. This can be managed effectively by the applicant and the WPC welcome their appearance at the Parish Council Meetings to discuss their proposal. Site History
- Previous Applications The application is fairly small compared to the work that has been previously carried out.

National Planning Policy Framework - The key goal of the National planning policy framework is to achieve 'sustainable development'. This is centered around United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs) which is centred around the following three points:

- Economic Sustainability In general, the proposal supports the existing agricultural economy and is proportional to the existing economy of the area.
- Social Sustainability We encourage members of the Parish to submit their responses to all planning applications. The proposed scheme acting to maintain the agricultural character of the area and provide education on rural issues is welcomed by the WPC.
- Environmental Sustainability Environmental issues have been highlighted in this response and further mitigations and recommendations are made in the introduction section. However, the WPC appreciates the applicants concern for maintaining the environment.

#### Sky watching in Whitestone

Situated in Devon within reach of Dartmoor's renowned Dark Sky Reserve, Whitestone benefits from exceptionally low light pollution. On clear nights, especially during moonless periods, you can clearly see the Milky Way, bright constellations such as Lyra and Scorpius, and planets without visual interference.

Perseid Meteor Shower (Peak: 12–13 August)
This is the highlight of the month. The Perseids, visible from around mid-July to late August, often produce 60–100 meteors per hour at their peak on the night of 12–13 August.

Best observed after midnight when the radiant in Perseus climbs overhead and skies are darkest. Since the Moon is waning crescent or new around that time, conditions in 2025 are particularly favourable.

Head to open fields or elevated lawns away from local streetlights. Whitestone benefits from largely rural skies. Allow your eyes to adapt to darkness for 20–30 minutes (reduce screen use). For meteor watches, lie flat with feet facing south, scanning wide areas of sky rather than focussing on one point.

<u>Planets, Constellations & Conjunction Events</u>
Saturn rises in the south east shortly after dusk and appears especially bright in early mornings, dominating the eastern sky well after midnight

Jupiter typically follows Saturn by a couple of hours, appearing in the east for early-morning viewing.

On 9 August, look east just after midnight to spot a lovely alignment: Jupiter, a crescent Moon, and the Pleiades star cluster. With binoculars, Uranus is visible near the Moon too.

Other planetary pairings like Mars and Jupiter get very close mid-month, offering great binocular or naked eye views before dawn.

Look south after sunset for Scorpius, with its fiery red star Antares shining bright, and south west for the graceful harp of Lyra.

On the dimmest nights (around the new moon on 23 August), the Milky Way becomes clearly visible as a hazy band stretching overhead.

#### In Summary

August in Whitestone, Devon offers premium celestial viewing: from dazzling meteor showers to bright planets and classic constellations framed by truly dark skies. Whether a casual admirer or a dedicated stargazer, this month provides the perfect backdrop for exploring the heavens. Just step outside after dark, look up—and let the skies amaze.

### **Artificial Intelligence**

You may have seen or heard the phrase 'Artificial Intelligence' being mentioned in the press or on radio or television. Artificial Intelligence (AI) is the field of computer science focused on creating systems or machines that can perform tasks typically requiring human intelligence.

Al mimics aspects of human cognition such as:

- Learning from experience or data (like how we train a dog)
- Reasoning to solve problems or make decisions
- Understanding language and responding meaningfully
- Perceiving the world through sensors, images, or sound

#### Real-World Example

- Voice assistants like Siri or Alexa
- · Self-driving cars that navigate roads and traffic
- Companions that can chat, create, and help with tasks
- Medical diagnostics that analyze scans and predict health risks.

Al is kind of like the "brain" inside machines, but instead of neurons, it uses algorithms and data. Its potential is huge but it raises serious ethical questions that must be addressed:

#### Key Ethical Issues

- Bias & Fairness
- Al can inherit societal biases from training data, leading to discrimination.
- Privacy
- Al systems often rely on massive data collection, risking personal privacy.
- Accountability
- When AI makes a mistake, it's unclear who is responsible—developer, user, or system?
- Transparency
- Many Al models are "black boxes," making their decisions hard to explain.
- Displacement
  - Automation may replace certain jobs, requiring reskilling and new policies.
- Surveillance & Control
  - Al-powered monitoring can threaten civil liberties if misused.
- Weaponization
  - Autonomous weapons raise concerns about human oversight and global security.

Al's future is dazzling—but only if we steer it wisely. You are free to explore how Al might impact your field or interests or dive deeper into one of these ethical dilemmas.


